Over the years, rules have changed. And also Delta's rules change like the Delta Athletic Awards. Now there are more rules for the benefit of Delta's students.

To qualify for a letter jacket, students used to have to earn 300 points, with at least 200 coming from two varsity letters. For the lifetime athletic pass, students used to earn at least 1,000 points by playing varsity in fall, winter, and spring from freshman year till senior year.

But parents started asking to pay for their son's or daughter's letter jacket, because some students did not even get a letter jacket until their senior year.

Now they just have to participate in at least one semester of varsity sport for a varsity letter. With a varsity letter, the student will be able to purchase a jacket.

For the lifetime passes, the rules have been changed to get rid of the point system. Now the students need to earn at least 10 varsity letters for a lifetime pass.

The new letter jacket rule benefits lots of our students, because they are able to earn a letter jacket already in their freshman year.

"The students should like the change because they will be eligible for a jacket much earlier," Athletic Director Shane Hill said.

The new Athletic Awards rule will have a considerable impact. "More letter jackets will display the athletes' accomplishments," Hill said.

Under old and new rules Delta has two qualifiers for a lifetime pass in the senior class of 2014: Adam Bantz and Rob Fox.

Bantz is excited for his lifetime pass. "I will probably use it for track and cross country meets," he said.

He played soccer for three years, ran cross country for two years, was diving for one year, and ran track for two years. With years in many different sports, his favorite is cross country.

Bantz got his letter jacket already in his sophomore year and the letter in his first season of soccer freshman year.

Rob Fox is also very excited for the lifetime pass since he

planned to use it often. "I have three younger brothers and two younger cousins at Delta that I will come back and watch play," Fox said.

Fox played three years of varsity football, one year of freshman football, two years of varsity basketball, one year of JV and freshman basketball each, and all four years of varsity baseball. His favorite sport is baseball by far. "It's just an incredible game that makes you think and challenges you each day," he said.

Like Bantz, he earned his letter jacket in the fall of his sophomore year.

It looks like we will see a lot of letter jackets around Delta in upcoming school years which will strengthen Deltonian bonding.

Valedictorian headed to vet school

Every morning, senior Andrea Grasso wakes up at the same time as Pixie, Vinny, Luna, Lola, Gus, Fiona, Poppy, Maeby, Dennis, and Dora. She helps her parents feed them and prepare them for the day ahead.

No, Grasso doesn't have a flock of younger siblings, although she does have one older sister. She has four dogs, four cats, one fish, and one rabbit. And that's just at her house. She helps her parents run the Albany Veterinary Clinic, which has impacted her future career decisions.

Grasso, the valedictorian of the class of 2014, plans to attend Purdue University in West Lafayette, where she will major in chemistry. She

was accepted into Purdue's Veterinary Scholars Program, which grants her automatic admission into their prestigious veterinary school after she completes three years of undergraduate study.

After college, she plans to open her own veterinary practice or pursue a career in animal oncology research. Her interest in animal oncology, the treatment of cancer in animals, isn't just pure curiosity.

"It really impacted me when I found out my dog Pixie has cancer," she said. "It affected what I wanted to do in veterinary medicine."

Grasso's love for animals is an inherited trait. Since both her parents are veterinarians, she was exposed to animals from a young age. Like many young kids, she dreamt of becoming a veterinarian when she grew up. Unlike most, however, she stuck with it.

Despite her family's extensive background in all things furry, Grasso said she never felt any pressure from her parents to follow in their footsteps. They have been supportive about her academics and encouraged her to explore other career fields. Ultimately, though, Grasso decided that veterinary science was where she belonged.

Currently, she works at the clinic several days a week after school and a few weekends a month. Her responsibilities include taking care of the animals boarding at the clinic, assisting with clients and their animals, and cleaning. Seeing the day-to-day operations of a clinic has shown her the realities of being a veterinarian.

"It's not all cute puppies and kittens," Grasso said. "There are certain parts of veterinary medicine

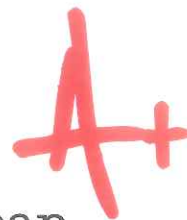
that aren't all glamorous. It's not always fun to be around animals."

While it may seem that Grasso has only spent her high school years surrounding herself with animals, she has thrown herself into a multitude of sports and other organizations over the past four years.

much work he must put into everything," Dr. Brand said.

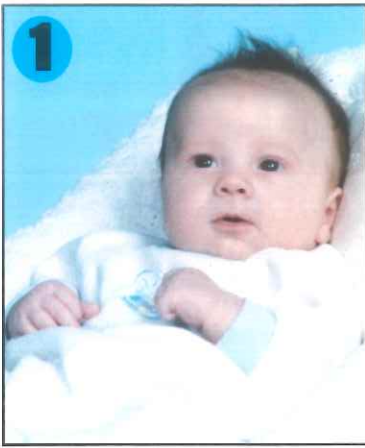

encouragement for her during her years on the team.

Mr. Wray appreciated the strong senior leadership role she upheld on the team this year. He could always count on her and the other seniors to lead the underclassmen through warm-ups and walking the course while he was gone at pre-race coaches' meetings.

In spite of the competitive nature of the sport, she was a team player who continuously encouraged her fellow runners to work hard. Mr. Wray said that sometimes there are athletes who are only out for themselves, but Grasso was one who was interested in seeing everyone do well.

To him, the most defining aspect of Grasso's high school running career was her tenacity in battling back from compartment syndrome, a condition she developed in eighth grade. For Grasso, pressure builds

up in her calf, causing constant pain.

Mr. Wray said that many people would have quit after developing the syndrome, but Grasso refused to let the ailment keep her from pursuing the sport.

"It's been tough, but I try to do my best understanding that my limits are larger (than other people)," Grasso said.

Outside of Delta, she has been a five-year participant in Leader Dogs for the Blind, a group that raises puppies to become seeing-eye dogs. After having trained the puppies for their future jobs, she finds fulfillment in their "graduation" ceremony.

"You get to see your hard work pay off because you get to see who the dogs are leading after they graduate," she said.

Being at the top of her class hasn't been easy for Grasso, but the presence of her friends has made the workload easier for her. They have taken many of the same classes together, which has allowed them to work together to understand concepts and lessons.

"We really do push each other," she said.

Senior Maren Orchard, one of Grasso's best friends, had to agree. She ran alongside Grasso on the cross country team, but doesn't see that as the only place the two friends can encourage each other.

"She helps me with math and I help her with English," Orchard said.

Dr. Lance Brand, biology and anatomy teacher, appreciates the high level of learning that Grasso and her friends brought to his classes.

"It's probably spoiled me as a teacher," he said. "They tend to do their work, and they tend to ask engaging questions."

As far as Grasso is concerned, Dr. Brand is confident she will succeed at vet school. Beside her strong work ethic, he said that her ability to think critically and ask thoughtful questions will aid her at Purdue.

Grasso leaves behind few regrets at Delta as she prepares to depart for college in the fall. Looking back, however, she wishes that she had joined the swim team earlier and gotten more involved in extracurriculars.

"I'm kind of shy, so I didn't put myself out there as much as I should have," she said.

It's something Grasso has resolved to change while at Purdue. She has already looked into potential clubs and groups to join, including a running club, several different science groups, and a program in which girls majoring in areas of science share a dorm floor.

Because of the dorm rules at Purdue, Grasso is not allowed to bring any pets with her during her first year, but things aren't going to stay that way for long. She plans to move into an apartment after her freshman year and bring one of her pets along with her.

Grasso's parents want her to bring along Poppy, one of their cats, but Grasso thinks Lola, their black lab, is the right companion for her in West Lafayette. Either way, Grasso is going to have at least one reminder of home with her at Purdue.

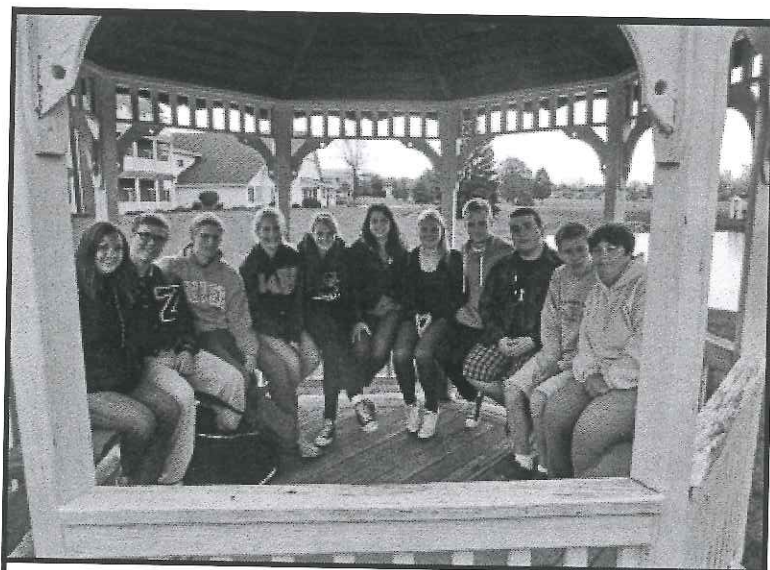

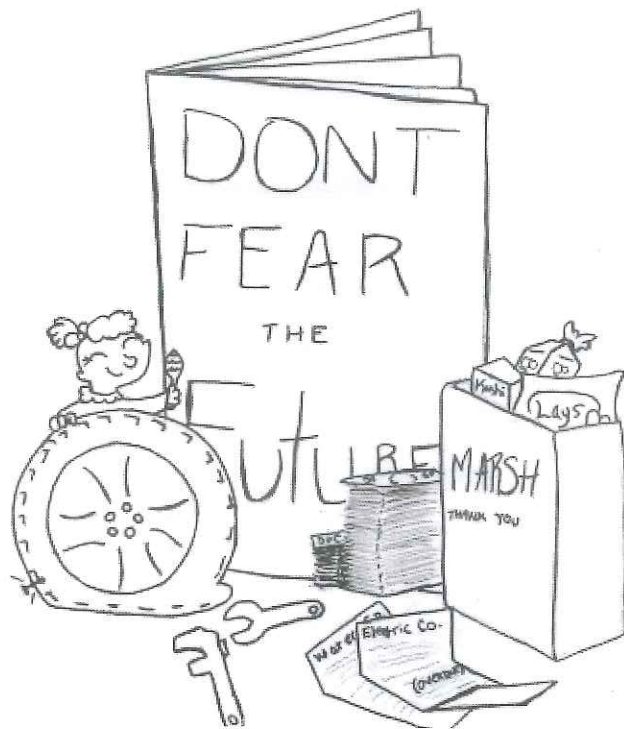

Trees and other roadblocks cover the path toward the completion of "Play It Forward"

First it was an idea, then it was a plan, and now it is becoming a reality. The 2.9 million dollar plan "Play it Forward" has been in action since the winter

with the destruction of the football stadium. The plan is divided into three stages. With stage one involving

getting the football stadium knocked down and installing in restrooms and concessions by the softball diamond and soccer fields, which the plan is still in.

The progress of the bleachers right now is the foundation for the bleachers has been ordered. They plan to have it on site between mid-June and the 1st of July, and have it erected the first two weeks of July. However, a question that usually comes up when building a new stadium is, will it be done on time?

"I am 99 percent certain they will be done," Superintendent Mr. Steve Hall said.

Stage two consisted of moving the baseball diamond to where the soccer field is now and the soccer field to where the current baseball field is and adding lights to the soccer field, baseball diamond and softball diamond. Stage two is planned to start next spring or summer depending on the money is raised. Now, do we have enough money to finish "Play it Forward"?

"Not enough to finish all three stages," Mr. Hall said. "Have enough for the bleachers but still need \$50,000."

Stage two got started with the clearing of the woods back by the soccer field so there was room to put the baseball field but then it stopped. It turns out that part

of the woods is a protected wetland. There was a study in 2000 that showed that the woods wasn't a wetland, but then in 2005 there was another study that showed it was a wetland, so some trees have to be put back. The woods will not affect the soccer field but there is a plan to have the soccer teams' play behind the baseball field if it is not safe to play by the woods. The other part of stage 2 is the baseball field being moved. The school board wrote a grant to the Haddad Foundation in Columbus, Ind. who has interest in athletic and recreational projects.

"It was a long shot," Mr. Hall said. "They usually work in Bartholomew, Johnson and Marion counties."

The final stage, which has not started yet, involves adding six new tennis courts and building a new wrestling/football locker room. So when will the plan be finished.

"The target is when this year's freshmen graduate," Mr. Hall said.

Bradley Wuthrich: I plan to study pre-pharmacy at Purdue. After I get my degree, I want to work in a hospital.



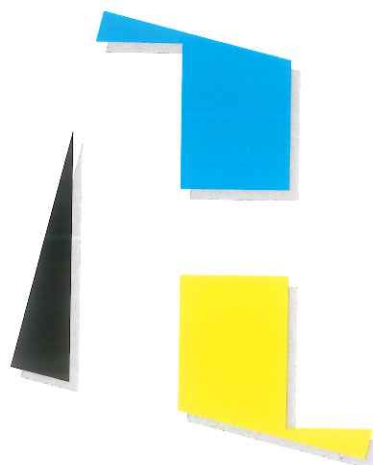
