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
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# Ready for Change?

# The school board recently met to decide on the new rules for the '09-'10 school year. Several changes will affect students.

For next school year, there will be a new cell phone policy. This is just one of eight changes in the handbook. The handbook also will have an updated version of the infractions table.

#### CELL PHONE POLICY

All student cell phones should remain off between the hours of 7:40 a.m. and 3:05 p.m. In the rare event a student needs to contact a parent or guardian throughout the school day he/she may come to the front office and ask permission to do so, or the student may use the pay phone during his/her lunch time. It is highly recommended that students not bring cell phones to school. Delta High School does not have insurance to cover lost or stolen valuables, cell phones, articles, etc. All cellular phones or cellular devices, if brought to school, should remain off and in the student's locker between the times stated above. Any student who violates this policy, including having his/her cell phone on, having his/her cell phone out of their locker, or having his/her cell phone on their person at any time between 7:40 and 3:05, will face the consequences as outlined in the disciplinary rubric. Any student violating the cell phone policy who refuses to hand over his/her cell phone when requested by a teacher or administrator will receive an out-of-school suspension.

#### DRIVING POLICY

There will be a new driving and parking policy. It states: Driving is a privilege, which can be taken away at the discretion of school administration. Students who would like to drive must register their car and obtain a parking

pass. This pass is free and may be picked up in the reception area in the main office. If that parking pass is lost then another pass must be purchased for \$5. This pass must be visible. If they have parked in an inappropriate area, or if they are parked incorrectly, they may be disciplined as shown below. If a student is ticketed and does not see the administration within two school days, it will be deemed as insubordination and dealt with as a discipline issue.



# Crider's competitiveness helps her reach top

Long before senior Kelly Crider was in high school, she knew she wanted to be valedictorian of her graduating class, like her father and sister before her.

"I believed that I too could be the top of my class if I consistently gave my best," Crider said.

The Commended National Merit Scholar and recipient of a Presidential Scholarship from Butler University (and an additional one from their chemistry department), Crider plans to major in chemistry at

Butler before attending Indiana University's medical school.

"Butler is one of the top universities in the Midwest," she said. "In addition to having an excellent academic program, it has a beautiful campus and prime location in the vibrant city of Indianapolis."

Crider points out that Butler is also known for its study abroad program.

"I hope to spend a semester studying in Europe or New Zealand," Crider said.


Crider is only the second person in Delta High School history to receive all A+ semester grades throughout her high school career. Megan Rybarczyk, class of 2005, was the first.

Behind the 12.0 honor roll scholar is a multitude of support from her family members.

"My family, friends and teachers were all huge factors in my academic success," Crider said.

She cites Mr. Tim Cleland, Mr. Kip Omstead, Mrs. Pat Ervin, Mr. Paul Orchard, Mr. John Miller and Mrs. Karen Cope as teachers who have pushed her to be the best she could be.

"Mr. Cleland in particular has been a positive

influence in my life," Crider said. "As a tennis coach, he has been a father figure for me and countless others and has helped build a family that I know I will be able to rely on throughout my life."

Cleland, coach of the boys' and girls' tennis teams, said he's never heard Kelly say she's bored.

"She finds joy in the simple things," Cleland said. "... She can just have a good time living life."

He likes how she takes the initiative to do things on her own. As editor-in-chief of the yearbook this year, she gained experience in leadership.

"She's so driven and independent that you don't have to be right there beside her every step of the way," Cleland said. "She's enthusiastic, competitive, and passionate about

what she does."

Replacing Kelly as a student in the classroom and as a tennis player on the court is going to be hard, Cleland said. She has played No. 1 singles the past two years and will graduate as one of the top 10 players in career victories in Delta tennis history.

"You don't come across someone who has her act together like that very often," Cleland said.

"Replacing her in either of those roles is really like replacing two players — one with talent and one with leadership for others."

After high school, Crider doesn't need much advice, Cleland said.

"I know she'll do well because she's driven and a

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self-starter," Cleland said. "She doesn't have an ounce of give up in her."

Kelly's older sister Kristin, the valedictorian of the class of 2007, advised and counseled Crider when she needed it. Kristin will be a junior at Butler.

"She provided a standard of excellence which I strove to live up to," Kelly said.

 $Kristin \ \mbox{feels}$  it is not surprising Kelly followed in her footsteps.

"I always knew that Kelly possesses both the intelligence and the drive to get her to the top and keep her there," Kristin said. "I was confident that she could do it, though I know she had some good competition."

The sisters are close enough that Kristin says they're like best friends and people often think they're twins.

"Kelly is truly one of a kind .... What stands out to me are her witty sense of humor, her strong sense of right and wrong, her intensity, and her strength of spirit," Kristin said.

However, Kristin said Kelly is not going to Butler

merely because that is where she goes.

"She's going there because she's decided that it's the right school for her," Kristin said. "I'm personally overjoyed that we'll be together for two whole years."

Kristin believes selfdiscovery will be an important part in Kelly's college years.

"Kelly already has a much better understanding of who she is than many adults do, but I'm still excited to see what new interests she finds and what new aspects of her personality come to light," Kristin said.

Fellow tennis team member junior Taylor Cardini is happy her team captain is number one in the senior class.

"I know she deserves it because she works really hard," Cardini said.

Cardini's favorite memory of Crider proves she has a silly side, too.

"We'd do wild and crazy stuff like at the Jeffersonville boys' (tennis) invite," she said. "The girls share a room and we run around the halls—just because we can."

Crider's demeanor on the tennis court is another thing Cardini admires.

"She's really encouraging," Cardini said. "She's always the person that if we win or lose, she'll tell you what to do, and she won't take crap from anybody."

Kelly's mother, Mary Foster, recalled how Kelly didn't want to attend kindergarten.

"We tried to get her pumped for kindergarten," Foster said. "We told her it'd be fun, there'd be games, and snacks. Kelly kept saying, 'No, I don't want to go.'"

Foster said Kelly was determined not to go. "When I picked her up after her first day, I asked her how it went and she said, 'Yes, I'll do kindergarten, but that's it,' "Foster said with a laugh.

While Kelly was in kindergarten, Foster said she'd always come home with comments on her report cards about how hyperactive she was.

"They'd always say, 'Kelly will not stay on her carpet square,' 'Kelly shouts out,' 'Kelly annoys neighbors,'" Foster said.

Her mother was afraid Kelly would never become a reader, either.

"I used to worry," she said. "Kelly was a TV addict when she'd come home from school."

After her sister Kristin won an Accelerated Reader award, though, Foster said it lit a fire under Kelly.

"Thank goodness Kristin won," Foster said. "... Kelly's all about competition."  $\!\!\!\!$ 

Foster's advice for Kelly is simple.

"Be happy, but do good being happy. Find a balance in life — be good to your fellow man and give back to others," she said.

Salutatorian Jared Bullock also commends Kelly.

"She's nice to
everyone and doesn't make
judgments before she really
gets to know someone,"
Bullock said. "She's
extremely competitive, but
she also has a beautiful
empathy for people in
general and is always looking

for something she can do for others."

While one might think the race for number one might have been competitive between them, Bullock begs to differ.

"I think it's great that Kelly is graduating at the top of our class. Most people seem to think there's some kind of tension about the whole best-friends one-and-two thing, but it's been a good friendly competition for both of us," Bullock said. "I think we have always pushed each other to work harder, and I think we're both better people for it."

Bullock agrees with Kristin's assessment of Kelly.

"She has been blessed with a gift to see past the fronts people put up and love them for who they really are, and I think that will get her exactly where she is supposed to be in life," Bullock said. "We all have high expectations of her, and I know she's been blessed with the attitude and drive to make it happen."







Athletic Director, Mr. Stan Daugherty said, "We are very sorry to see him retire. He was an outstanding coach."


Devine is continuing as a physed teacher but is retiring from coaching for more "family time." "My energy level just isn't what it used to be," Devine said. "I need to go home after school."

Students from Mrs. Carmichael's and Mrs. Green's kindergarten classes at Royerton Elementary express what they want to be when they grow up.







Other than photo-graphy, Bullock reads and





Bullock's favorite class through his high school years was the American Studies Block class with Mrs. Pat Ervin and Mr. Kip Omstead.



Girls' golf had a winning season this year and their best yet. They broke the school record for low team scores with a score of 169. They reached regional and ended with a record of 14-2.




